TOP TIPS TO KEEP FLIES AT BAY IN THESE SUNNIER TIMES:

Reep your stable yards and paddocks clean and muck free as possible. Poo pick field regularly. Site muck heaps away from horses.

Remove stagnant water sources - breeding grounds- clean out water troughs and deal with leaks regularly. Maintain drains.

Cover up - use correctly fitting clean fly rugs, masks and leg wraps if necessary.

Fly repellents- try to find the most effective fly repellent for your midges/flies and your horses. May need to rotate and change products regularly. Will need to be applied regularly.

Stable horses at risk times
- dawn and dusk. Provide
shelter - clean, dark, cool

Use fans directed out of barns to prevent flies coming in.

screens/curtains can be used in well-ventilated stables and barns.

Try to use breezy paddocks and keep your horses clean and cool.

Avoid long grassy areas

and disturbing leaves and branches in wooded areas where horse flies rest

Use cool water to soothe fly bites. Aloe vera gel may help reduce swelling.

POWER AND PERFORMANCE

One of the most common causes of poor performance i.e not achieving the desired level capable in whatever sphere you choose to ride your horse in; is due to low grade hind limb lameness, often bilateral (in both legs).

This can sometimes be very difficult to detect and may show as behavioural changes. The most common cause is pain from the lowest joints of the hock. This can be treated by directly medicating these joints. The results of medicating the tarsometatarsal (TMT) joints can often be amazing adding power and vitality to your horse.

We most commonly use steroid medication; acting as a potent anti inflammatory and pain relief. However, there are other options too. These include Arthramid, a 2.5% iPAAG hydrogel which forms a bio-scaffold within the joint, helping to strengthen the joint and help the synovium (the joint lining) regenerate and produce better quality joint fluid to cushion the forces through the joint.

We also now have a stem cell treatment commercially available, Arti-cell Forte, which hopes to repair and heal damaged cartilage within the joint.
