CARING FOR YOUR HORSES IN THE WARMER WEATHER

With the temperatures being a little warmer currently, please find some tips to ensure your horse is comfortable:

WATER

Ensure that your horse always has access to clean water to prevent any risk of dehydration. A horse on average can drink approximately 25 litres per day which can increase when they are warm.

SHELTER

Ensure your horse has access to shelter if it is in the field or alternatively bring your horse in to a stable for the warmest part of the day.

FLY PROTECTION

Ensure that your horse has been covered in fly spray and if sensitive to fly bites a fly sheet and mask can reduce the annoyance from flies. Turning out overnight and stabling during the day can risk annoyance from flies also.

<u>SUNBURN</u>

Like humans, horses can suffer from sunburn. Horses with pink muzzles are most at risk. Applying sun protection liberally on those pink areas will help to prevent the skin from getting sunburnt along with a mask can also help. Eye problems in horses can be very serious, in severe cases they can result in an eye needing to be removed. Conjunctivitis, uveitis and corneal ulcers are all common problems in horses.

Conjunctivitis

Uveitis

Conjunctivitis (often known as pink eye in people), occurs when either the inner membrane of the eyelid, or the membrane covering the white of the eye is inflamed. The eye is often sore and often has a clear or green discharge.

Uveitis occurs when there is inflammation to the inner structures of the eye. Uveitis is incredibly painful condition which often results in the horse holding their eye closed with clear discharge present. The eye itself is usually cloudy and the pupil can be very constricted, limiting the horse's vision through the eye.

Corneal ulcers

Corneal ulcers occur when there is a trauma or scratch to the surface of the eye. A green stain is used to identify a corneal ulcer. Ulcers are again very painful, with the horse holding their eye shut and often with a clear discharge.

Enucleations



Just a few weeks after an enucleation, the wound has healed, and the horse is adapting well.

In some cases, the damage to the eye becomes irreparable and the best course of action is to remove the eye (enucleation). This operation can be done under sedation and local anaesthetic, either on the yard or in our stocks at North Tawton.

If you are ever in doubt about the health of your horse's eyes, please do not hesitate to contact our reception team to book either an initial phone appointment or visit – early detection of problems is key.
